# Gender Performativity

- Performative
  - Gendered identities emerge through iterations of acts endorsed as gendered within a society
- Need to look at communities of practice to find local meanings of categories like *female* and *male*

- All gender is performative
  - People can perform male
  - People can perform female
- When one is directly indexing masculinity, what are they indirectly indexing?
